Yoshitaka Wada (Professor of Law, Waseda Law School, Japan)

Abstract: Importance of disclosure and apology after medical accident happened is now widely accepted. However, misunderstandings and conflicts may happen in the process of disclosure onversation, even when physicians are sincere and honest, because of the difference of socially constructed perspectives on healthcare and accidents between physicians and patients. In Japan, mediation skills are recently considered to be useful to support disclosure process and many risk managers are receiving mediation training.. Although, it is completely different concept from legal and formal mediation, they are called In-house Healthcare Mediator in Japan. They help physicians and patient family in disclosure conversation in order to reduce emotional and some factual conflicts by healing patient family's suffering and anger, by promoting amicable conversation and information sharing and by making parties recognize the other party's perspective, but they never handle legal and monetary issues. In USA Michigan University Health System has a similar model in which all risk managers receive mediation training and utilize it to take care of patient family after accident. Moreover, Patient Advocate of American Hospital Association also began to offer mediation training. It can be useful for complaint managers and PALS people in UK. This presentation shows promising role of mediation skills---not legal or formal mediation---in facilitating disclosure process and rebuilding patient-physician relationships based on Japanese experiences.
